5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

Heads of the departments meet once in a fortnight to discuss on the progress of students in academics .The suggestions and feedback from the staff helps the college in taking policy decisions in framing a suitable system to assure and enhance academic performance of the students in each and every semester.

The Principal and Department Heads meet & counsel students periodically to give them necessary directions regarding their future course of action. Personal guidance, on both academic and non-academic matters, is given to the students through mentoring. Each student has a mentor, whom the students can approach for academic and personal counselling. Mentors offer academic counselling to students, help them choose open courses, recommend them for special scholarships and also meet parents of the mentees if necessary.



It helps the students with appropriate guidance to establish links with the industry and get placement. Effective coaching is given in this direction to the students. The Training and Placement Cell of the College has initiated a Training Process for all the departments in Verbal ability, Quantitative ability. Special sessions to impart training for Group Discussion, to prepare CV and successfully tackle interviews are organised. About 6 companies visited the College, Campus and 56 students from various departments were given placement in the industry.



6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Restructuring of curriculum development is systematically implemented once in 5 years by the University. The syllabus is reviewed and suggestions for revision are made to the University through members of the various Boards of Studies after feedback from the students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college has an objective and effective system of student evaluation (Internal) through which a meaningful teaching and learning is assured. Testing and evaluation patterns are constantly reviewed to ensure quality in critical thinking and competence.

One class rooms in each department are enabled with ICT provisions and well equipped Labs, Digital Library enable students with greater learning experience aptly supported by inputs from teachers.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

University is conducting external exams for UG and PG programmes. Internal setting of question papers for semester examinations is done by the college. The college has been maintaining an objective system of conducting internal examination and evaluation. The results are published within a month's time.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The Research coordinator supervises the research work in the college and encourages the research potential of the college with adequate infrastructure support. The staffs are constantly encouraged to apply for minor projects and major projects from UGC and other funding agencies. Several such projects are currently in progress. Ph.D. work is continuously supervised from the beginning till the Viva Voce examination. PG and UG projects are also monitored by supervisors rigorously. The periodical meeting of Researchers is successful for mutual knowledge sharing in interdisciplinary scientific research.

College has a well established internet facility within the campus.

ICIT- A separate department was established to get the basic knowledge of computer literacy for the UG level students.

The Department of Physics procured a spray Pyrolysis equipment, Dip coating Unit, Spin Coating Unit, Keithley 2401 Source Measure and a Centrifuge during 2014 -15.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college has a well written policy on appointment of staff and handling of grievances. Principal and Manager of the college provide leadership and able administration to carry out various requirements of effective Human Resource management.

Orientation and training programmes are periodically organized for new staff. In order to improve the quality of staff need-based training/workshops are organized. Recreation programmes are also organized for teaching, non-teaching and supportive staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

State, University, HOD and management representatives appoint teachers for the college. This committee conducts recruitment process as and when vacancy arises with an objective and transparent process with the prior approval from state Government.
