Qualitative analysis of Criterion 1

Union Christian College, Aluva was **established in 1921** as the realization of the shared dream and passion of a group of young visionaries. **The College opened admissions to women in the year 1958**, thereby initiating women's access to higher education in Kerala. It completed its **centenary in 2021**. The College has a campus area of **42.4 acres** and a built-up area of **110,400 sq. mt.**

The college is affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam and is a recognized minority institution.. The college offers **16 UG and 14 PG programmes and 10 research centers**. It enrolled 2722 students (the majority of **61.85% being girls**) and 76 PhD Scholars. The College has 139 full time teachers of which 58 are Ph.D holders and 46 supporting staff.

The college adheres to **Choice Based Credit System** curriculum designed by the Mahatma Gandhi University for UG, PG and PhD programmes. In terms of curriculum design, **30 teachers** were members of **Boards of Studies (BOS)** in the affiliating University during the assessment period - with 13 teachers (including 2 Chairpersons) in 2017, and 18 teachers (including 1 Chairperson) after a revision in 2021. The college has **2(f) and 12(B)** status of the University Grants Commission (UGC), New Delhi

College maintains academic flexibility through its curriculum and syllabus revision. Planning, implementation and evaluation processes of curriculum are monitored by the IQAC, Staff Council, Heads of Departments and Internal Examination Committee.

There is a systematic mechanism that follows the **University Academic Calendar, with College Academic Calendar, Department Calendar, College Handbook, Course Plans, Academic Work Diaries and Lesson Plans** to facilitate planning and time bound delivery. **ICT enabled, participatory** learning through LMS Moodle, Google classroom, Google Meet and Zoom, supplemented by **seminars and workshops on crosscutting issues ensures holistic education** and time bound delivery. **Entry Level Testing, Bridge Courses, and Remedial Sessions** are conducted to enable effective curriculum delivery. **Centralized Internal Assessment** and consistent result analysis is supported by a **well-documented feedback system**.

The college implemented Outcome Based Education, in line with NEP 2020, with well-defined POs, PSOs and COs. The college offered 269 Value Added courses during the assessment period, with 70% students

enrolled. The NPTEL Local Chapter initiated in 2018 and 3940 students enrolled in 208 NPTEL- Swayam courses. In all round development of the young generations, the college offers value added courses to address the issues relevant its surroundings like National integration, Human Rights, Farming, Manure Making, Cultural heritage, Environmental Studies and Gender studies. To build up good personalities the college has associations such as NSS and NCC. Moreover NCC studies help students who wish to make a career in defense and serve the country. Feedback on curriculum, academic performance and ambience of the institution were collected and corrective measures taken

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

The Union Christian College is committed to providing education that facilitates the wholesome growth and brings out the best in the student so that they would serve our nation and humanity at large and the ecosystem, as intellectually competent, morally upright and spiritually inspired persons.

The college has constantly focused on student-cantered academic and examination reforms and policies. The admission Process is carried out through the online Centralized Allotment Process regulated by Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam. The college has an average student enrolment ratio of 95.17%.

In alignment with the National Education Policy, the College effectively implements activities to facilitate student-centric learning. The college undertakes Remedial coaching and special attention and extra lectures are taken for slow learners **for easy assimilation and to have transformative learning**. College undertakes Student-centered teaching strategies - active problem-based learning, flipped classroom, case studies, presentations, cooperative learning, group discussions, etc. to help in better understanding of the subjects. **They are also advised to take part is Department-Oriented activities and organizing Association-Oriented functions, motivated to take part in Quiz competitions, advised to refer more books of library.** Innovative teaching methods and ICT tools aid effective curriculum delivery. LMS Moodle and other learning platforms like Google Classroom and other open educational resources enhance effective teaching-learning process.

A transparent and fair method of assessment is in place, based on University regulations where each semester the learner's competence is assessed in Formative and Summative formats. The institution has a three-tier grievance redressed mechanism for exam related grievances - Department, College and University level.

The Institution follows Program outcomes (PO), program specific outcome (PSO) and course outcomes (CO) which are incorporated in all the department syllabi. This helps to incorporate the knowledge, skills and behavior that the students acquire through a wide range of courses. Outcome Based Education (OBE) is student centric, teaching and learning model through which the curriculum planning is done for attaining stated objectives and goals (outcome). Students are mentored effectively under mentor-mentee program.

The IQAC of the college collects online feedback from the students both about teaching and institutional facilities. The feature of online feedback mechanism is practiced effectively and the analysis is also done within timely basis.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 3

The institution has defined Policy for Promotion of Research which focuses on formulation and Development Cell, Research Committee and Promotion of Research in the college. It facilitates collaborative research, and creates technology –oriented intellectual environment, etc. The institution has a vibrant research culture with 10 Research Centers, 37 Research Guides, 76 Research Scholars and a Research Advisory Council chaired by the Principal.

A Research Development Cell and 5 Research Committees deal with Finance and Infrastructure, Research Programme Policy Development, Collaboration and Community, Product Development Monitoring & Commercialization and IPR, Legal & Ethical Matters, respectively.

The institution has created an ecosystem for innovation, skill development, creation and transfer of knowledge and entrepreneurship among the students by dedicated centers for Research, Entrepreneurship, Incubation, etc. Institution has also established an, Indian Knowledge System (IKS), including awareness about IPR, and establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

One Student Startup Incubation has commenced with the fund of Research Incubation Grant funded by Research Incubation Programme (a joint venture of Kerala Startup Mission and Mahatma Gandhi University, Kerala). The product (Fertilizer Stick) will make gardening and agriculture easier. Dry Leaf Composting and effective canteen tea waste management are other innovative highlights. Indian Knowledge Systems have been effectively incorporated into the PG syllabi of various Departments. .

The institution was granted a total amount of Rs.220.59 lakhs in the form of Research Grants for 13 teachers during the assessment period. 105 workshops, seminars and conferences on various themes related to UNAI principles, SDGs including Research Methodology, IPR and entrepreneurship were held during the assessment period. 41 PhDs were awarded, 3 patents granted and 1 provisional patent filed during the assessment period. Faculty members are actively involved in research through research projects and publication..The College has 278 Research Journal publications and 224 Book Chapters authored by faculty members.

There are 43 MoU, 06 Collaborations and 07 Linkages for Faculty/ Student Exchange, Internship, Field Project, On-the-job training, Research and other academic activities. These were initiated and related activities held during the assessment period. The College has been granted funds from **RUSA, DST-FIST, DST-SERB, DST-WOS, DBT-STAR, UGC and KSCSTE.**

Extension activities are integral to the institution’s vision and mission. We envisage serving the nation through socially relevant education. The College is keen on orienting students to ‘learning by doing’ and this naturally leads to community outreach. The College has always been a crucial element of the development of the neighbouring community and institutions. The recognition and awards received for extension activities bear testimony to the enormous effort of the college community. As many as 123 Community Extension Activities were carried out in association with NCC, NSS, Aster Med city, Vara Club, Anti-Narcotics Cell, Disaster Management Club, Pain & Palliative Club, etc. Service Learning initiatives were carried out by various Departments.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 4

The Union Christian College is spread over 42.4 acres with an infrastructure having a mixture of ancestry, tradition and modernity. An old court house 'Kacheri Malika' lies in the heart of the college declared as protected monument by the Government of Kerala. The college has 214 rooms (Wi-Fi enabled) in which 128 rooms are for academic activities which includes, 77 classrooms and 51 labs (UG, PG and research) having 45% ICT enabled rooms. It also has 3 Museums which exposes the archaeological culture (History department- open to outsiders), Diversity of animals (Zoology department and Biosciences department)

The academic infrastructure includes, Four departments (Botany, Computer Science, Economics & Mathematics) are facilitated with interactive boards, There are 2 Botanical gardens maintained by Botany department and an Instrumentation rooms in Physics and Chemistry departments. 11 department level reference areas and Administrative block which boards Principal office, Bursar office, Manager's room, self-financing office, common staff room and the college administrative office

The college offers 16 UG programs, 14 PG programs, 1 Diploma program and research opportunities in 10 departments with 14 HOD rooms and 22 staff rooms.

The library caters to the educational needs of the academic community and is situated in 9,300 square feet building with a reading space of 222 seats., It has a collection of 83,516 printed books and are bar-coded. They have been using an Integrated Library Management Software Package-*Alice for Windows*-for the last 22 years. The library community includes users comprising students, faculty members and non-teaching staff members. Everyone has access an online package of e-journals (6,200+) and e-books (1,95,000+) through the N-LIST platform of INFLIBNET. The N-LIST facility is frequently used by the patrons of the library.

The Local Area Network (LAN) connects the library and teaching departments. The online catalogue (OPAC) of documents available over the LAN ensures accessibility to the collection. Ramp facility is provided for physically challenged students at the entrance.

The entire college campus has Wi-Fi coverage which ensures sustained internet connectivity throughout the campus. Moreover, the college is also equipped with other IT infrastructures like ICT enabled classrooms, smart classrooms and LMS Moodle. **It frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection.**

The computers are also provided with LAN connections, physical LAN Cables through 13 LAN connections. The computer labs, college office, self-financing office, management office, MBA and MCA offices, main library, MCA library and MBA library are provided with physical LAN connections through cables. The college has 35 ICT enabled classrooms and 4 smart classrooms with interactive boards and 15 computer laboratories.

The college uses a proprietary Learning Management System Moodle for supplementing the academic resources and for student evaluation. The college is furnished with 4 servers that serve various purposes of academics, administration, and administration at library. The campus is equipped with a total of 32 CCTV cameras, guaranteeing constant surveillance and safeguarding the well-being of students, teachers, and all other individuals associated with the institution.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 5

The institution provides many facilities to the students like good academic ambience, state government scholarship, various endowment prizes to the students. Certain special days are celebrated every year like the Soft skills, Language and communication skills, Life skills (Yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene), ICT/computing skills, Sports, Convocation, and Annual day. The college encourages the necessity of promoting in the students the extracurricular and co-curricular activities which helped them in bringing out their hidden talents

Various Committees/councils of the college have representation of students and students' bodies such as, Anti Ragging Cell, sports committee, discipline committee, library committee, research publication committee NSS, Admission Committee, Anti Sexual Harassment cell, placement cell, etc. Mechanisms for submission of online/offline students' grievances were also conducted. Placement Cell of the college is guiding students in fetching employment opportunities.

The Alumni Association of Union Christian College was established since February 1969, the Association was formally registered in 2023 under the Travancore-Cochin Literary, Scientific and Charitable Societies Registration Act, 1955 (Kerala Act 12 of 1955). It has been functioning for many years as a supportive organ of the college. Though functioning under a formal The Association has three international chapters and seven regional chapters. The alumni around the globe have imbibed the unique traditions of UCC, and maintain a lifelong connection with their Alma Mater.

The College has the alumni meet on every Second Saturday of November, past and present generations converge on the campus to celebrate our accomplishments, and share the joy of homecoming. The day includes General Body meetings, an induction ceremony for new faculty and honouring retiring teachers and staff. 81 alumni served as Resource Persons providing subject knowledge, career guidance, training and coaching on the Campus during the assessment period.

The OSA executive committee discusses accounts and future plans and welcomes alumni recommendations for enhancing academic quality, supporting research, fostering industry collaboration, realizing international linkages and implementing alumni projects. An exclusive July meet is executed every year for NRI alumni. During the Assessment Period contributions were made by the OSA. Were endowments Outreach Program, Rs. 4,80,000/, Seminars, Lectures ,other competitions as Rs, Rs. 8,60,179/-on books Rs.15,354 and Gandhimavu Digital Challenge' to provide digital gadgets to more than 200 needy students in the college through a contribution of Rs. 300000/-. OSA contribution worth Rs 12,82,775/- during the assessment period towards the Infrastructure Development of the institution.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 6

The college has an active and visionary management with well defined vision and mission, working for the educational moral and cultural advancement of the region. Activities of the college are in tune of vision and mission statement. The college has been trying to perform earnestly its holistic measures to inculcate a standard and culture by which learners from all fronts to receive the best practice to derive help of computers wherever possible and to give pertinent practical components in higher education. The curriculum has been designed in such a way which promotes them of qualities for employability, entrepreneurship, skill development, moral and ethical values and language efficiency.

For effective functioning governance and decision making, College has set up like different functional bodies Standing Council, College Staff Council,, Inter Church Fellowship and College Deans for Administrative and Academic work. The college, being a Government institution that strictly adheres to the procedures, rules and regulations of UGC and Kerala Service Rules is set up for managing the employees and for the recruitment for teaching staff. Faculty promotion is purely based on UGC guidelines; whereas nonteaching promotions are inclined with the policy of state government.

The prime purpose of Annual Academic Audit works to assess the functioning of the departments and enhancing the standards with regard to curriculum, teaching learning, research and student support. Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) and follow-up action taken and means so practiced are due to external academic audits being conducted to evaluate the performance of the departments. The external academic audit team consists of subject experts from other institutions and during such audit, team visits the departments.

The fund utilization and the working of the financial system is effectively monitored by the Bursar, who is a faculty member of the College, the Manager and the Principal. Institution implements e-governance in its operations like Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and also Support Examination.

The IQAC is established as per the norms of NAAC. Regular meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). It contributes to the improvement of quality of the institution and encourages application of ITC in teaching learning process. It ensures participation of NIRF, timely submission of AQAR to NAAC to adopt feedback mechanism. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities.

The College is a co-education institute and it was introduced in the year 1958. 52 Gender sensitization programs on Gender equality became a compulsory for all the students. **Institution has initiated the awareness program on Gender based issues.** All students, regardless of gender, have equal access to educational resources. The institution provides **adequate and appropriate facilities for women on campus** which is crucial for creating an inclusive and supportive environment. The college has a **NCC wing for girls, a woman program officer for NSS, residential hostel facilities for women staff and students, well-lit pathways with the presence of security personnel and CCTV surveillance** throughout the campus.

The College has various committees like, Grievance Redressed Cell, Women Cell and Discipline Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Anti Harassment Committee; has been set up to monitor and resolve safety, security, and social issues of the students. Policy Document for differently able students etc. helps the students to their needs. The college also caters to the needs of the mentally stressed students by setting up counseling cells for overall mental well-being of the students. They have also included **sports facilities and gender-neutral spaces** are provided in the campus.

The Institute has given emphasis on Sustainability in all feasible areas like **Water conservation, Green campus, Organic farming initiatives, Disabled-friendly, barrier free environment, Waste Management and Solar energy**. Quality audits on environment and energy regularly undertaken regularly by the Institution.
